**As the end of my 2<sup>nd</sup> time in office as president draws near, it's beneficial to reflect back on how far we've come. Over the past three years, OAG has made significant inroads in being a force to upgrading our profession. This is a lasting tribute to the dedicated people who serve as officers and directors on the OAG board of directors. Our signature issue HB-241 the apprentice MBE and Training bill continues to justify OAG support of this legislative initiative. Through an Open Records request filed with the state - to determine impact assessment of the recently changed law - it has been conclusively determined the pass/fail rate is trending upward as it was presumed the scores would though more comprehensive standards. This means more and better qualified candidates are achieving licensure status and going into the professional work force at an increasing rate. This is a direct benefit to the profession and the public.**

**In related context the OTA (Optical Training Academy) was developed in 2K7 to provide resource assistance to apprentice/trainees as they progress through a now predictable training process. For the benefit of licensees and trainees the Georgia Law c.e. course has been approved in 2K9 for ABO credit, making the course a valuable part of the Georgia license and ABO/NCLE certification renewal process. Additionally, we have moved to increase our continuing education footprint in Georgia by establishing a presence in Valdosta in the southwest section of the state. On the national level, OAG was an early supporter of the recently enacted 2K9 OAA TPA (Title Protection Act) Resolution which establishes for the first time - nationally - a minimum standard definition for the use of the title Optician.**

**The full measure and impact of the aforementioned initiatives have yet to be fully determined. However, the early indications are these were wise courses of action to take and will pay practical and professional dividends many times over in the years to come.**

**As president-elect Cora Lester assumes office 1 Nov. 2K10, I ask you to give her the support necessary to continue the progress of making Georgia opticianry first class.**

## Legislative Update – Fall 2010

We are at the 2 year mark for the passing of HB-241, the optician apprentice/trainee and registration bill sponsored and initiated by the Opticians Association of Georgia. Be there no doubt that this was a hard-fought victory and nationally acclaimed as a breakthrough in the ongoing effort to license all states nationwide.

You may recall that prior to the bill, official documented information revealed a dismal pass/fail rate on state board licensure issuance. The failure rate that spurred the legislation was approximately 70% over the previous 10 year period. Clearly, the old way wasn't working.

The OAG saw a clear fiduciary duty to take action in support of the professional interests of all Opticians across the state. It was time to raise the bar. Looking back, we are honored and enjoy a great sense of satisfaction as many groups fight for years and do not achieve the success we have.

We are proud to report that in response to an Open Records request filed with the GA State Board of Dispensing Opticians, information disclosed reveals the passing rate for licensure candidates has increased to an amazing 69% success rate. This is a resounding validation of the OAG's support of HB-241 the Apprentice Optician MBE Training and Registration Bill sponsored by State Representative Jill Chambers. The bill resulted in a change to the law OCGA 43-29-7, effective September 1, 2008 which upgraded the minimum training standards for apprentice/trainees and successfully raised the bar for Opticianry in Georgia.

### About the Board

The Georgia State Board of Dispensing Opticians consists of six members: five licensed dispensing opticians and one consumer member. Typically, the Board meets six times each year. Board meetings are open to the public, with the exception of executive session, in which confidential matters such as complaints, disciplinary items, and applications are discussed.

Licensed opticians prepare and dispense lenses, spectacles, eyeglasses, contact lenses and optical devices as authorized by a written prescription from an optometrist or physician skilled in diseases of the eye. Dispensing opticians can be considered for licensure after meeting specific educational or work experience requirements and examination.

## License Renewal Process

### How do I renew my license?

You may renew your license on the Professional Licensing Board website with a credit card. Click on the License Renewal icon and follow the instructions. You will be asked a series of questions including whether you have been arrested, convicted of a crime or received a board sanction since the last renewal, whether you have completed your continuing education requirements, and whether you are a U.S. citizen. Renewing your license via the website is the fastest way to renew your license.

The Professional Licensing Boards do not mail paper renewals unless requested. A paper renewal form may be requested by the licensee either by calling the Board office at 478-207-2440, or by submitting a written request.

### Disciplinary Issues:

The Board addresses these issues on a case-by-case basis and applies sanctions to those who violate the Georgia State Board of Dispensing Opticians Practice Act, Board rules, and policies. It is important that licensees review all laws, rules and policies that affect their profession. These may be found on the Board's website at [www.sos.ga.gov/plb/opticians](http://www.sos.ga.gov/plb/opticians).

All public disciplinary actions will be reflected in the Board minutes which may be found on the Georgia State Board of Dispensing Opticians website.

*Grounds for denial, suspension, revocation of a license, or other disciplinary actions may be found at O.C.G.A. § 43-29 or at O.C.G.A. § 43-1-19, which can be found on the Georgia State Board of Dispensing Opticians website.*

## Complaint Process Information

The Georgia General Assembly created the Georgia State Board of Dispensing Opticians to regulate the licensing and practice of dispensing opticians. The responsibility of administering the laws in O.C.G.A. § 43-29 is given to the Board whose members are appointed by the Governor. The Board determines if applicants meet licensure requirements, promulgates rules, and considers complaints against licensees and allegations of unlicensed practice. The process for disposing of complaints is as follows:

**Complaint Form:**

Complaints must be reported to and received by the Board in writing. Written complaints may be submitted to the Board office or be submitted on-line at <http://sos.georgia.gov/myverification/submitcomplaint.aspx>. Documents received in connection with a complaint will not be returned. The complaint must contain sufficient factual evidence indicating a clear violation of Georgia law or Board rules.

**Investigations:**

The Board gives serious consideration to all complaints. Further investigative action may be taken. Should you file a complaint, you may be contacted by a Board inspector or investigator for additional information. Investigative files are considered confidential for any purpose other than a hearing before the Board. However, the Board is authorized to release such records to another enforcement agency or lawful licensing authority.

**Notification Process:**

While the investigation is ongoing, the Board is unable to discuss the status of a complaint with anyone, including the complainant. When the Board has completed the case, the complainant will be notified in writing of the Board's actions. All public disciplinary actions will be reflected in the Board minutes which may be found on the Board's website.

## Frequently Asked Questions – GA Board of Dispensing Opticians

### What are the requirements for a dispensing opticians license?

Submit a completed application, non-refundable fee, copy of official birth certificate, copy of high school diploma, transcript or GED certificate, and a photo taken within one year. Complete applications with all attachments and documents shall be filed with the Board at least thirty (30) days prior to the examination.

**If applying on the basis of education**, the applicant must have satisfactorily completed a course of study in a recognized school of ophthalmic dispensing approved by the Board. An **official** College transcript, with graduation date, and copy of diploma must accompany application showing completion of program.

**If applying on the basis of experience**, submit the Affidavit of Experience and employment. If you worked under the supervision of an out-of-state Optician, Optometrist, or Medical Doctor, also submit a copy of their current license. **(Must have minimum of two years and 3,000 hours experience)**

**If applying on the basis of education and experience**, submit all documents listed above. All applicants are **required to pass** the American Board of Opticianry Examination (ABO), the National Contact Lens Examination (NCLE), and the Georgia Practical Examination. Submit **CURRENT** ABO & NCLE certificates or if applicable request scores be certified from the national board to our office.

### Do requirements differ for foreign applicants?

Foreign applicants are also required to pass the Georgia Practical Examination. Applicants who have obtained education requirements outside the United States will be reviewed by the Board.  
Acceptable titles for licensure:

- Optician's Assistant
- Degree in Opticianry
- Ophthalmic Dispensing & Opticianry certificates

Acceptable forms for verification of age other than a birth certificate:

- Green card
- Passport
- Naturalization certificate

### Do I have to take an examination?

All applicants are required to pass the Georgia Practical Examination. Section 43-29-7 (c) of the Law covers areas for which applicants will be tested on the Georgia Practical Examination. Chapter 420-8 of the rules covers areas for which applicants will be tested concerning practical training and experience.

### How much does it cost to obtain a license?

Dispensing Opticians application fee is \$115, a \$50 non-refundable application fee and \$65 examination fee. The re-examination application fee is \$65

### How long does it take to receive a dispensing opticians license after sitting for the examination?

Once all official results from the examination section, Board office review and submitted documentation are received please allow **4-6 weeks** to receive a license number. Once your license has been issued, it will be available on the website at <https://secure.sos.georgia.gov/myverification/>.

You may print your license from this site for proof of licensure until you receive your license and pocketcard.

How do I reinstate my license?

- Applicant must complete the reinstatement application;
- Applicant must pay a reinstatement fee of \$160; and
- Applicant must submit proof of at least 10 hours of Board approved continuing education obtained within the last two years.

The Board must approve all reinstatements

Does the Board have inactive status?

The Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians does not have inactive status

How do I submit address changes?

All address changes must be reported to the Board within 10 days after the move according to Rule 420-3-.01. The license number, name as it appears on the license, the old address and the new address is required.

The change of address form is located at the Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians website under download forms at <http://sos.georgia.gov/plb/opticians/>.

Address changes may be submitted by mail or fax (478) 207-1660.

Does the Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians have reciprocity?

No. The Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians does not have reciprocal agreements with other states.

How do I obtain another license if lost, stolen or name change?

When a license is lost or stolen, you must report it to the Board immediately and request an application for a duplicate license. Any time your name changes, you must apply for a duplicate/replacement license and submit a copy of legal documentation showing the change (marriage certificate, divorce decree or court order). A fee of \$25 is required to process the application and issue a new license. The processing time is approximately 7 to 10 business days.

What must I do to renew my license?

- Complete the renewal application that will be mailed to you at the time of renewal, or you may renew on-line at state website.
- All licenses expire March 31st of odd numbered years.
- The renewal fee is \$60.00
- Attain the required number of Continuing Education hours. See Board rule 420-9 for specific continuing education requirements.
- If you fail to renew by March 31st of the odd numbered year, your license will be administratively revoked and require reinstatement by the Board

Do I need to submit CE hours to the Board?

Yes, all Opticians must submit proof of their continuing education courses along with their renewal application. According to Board Rule 420-9-.01 (2), "with his/her application for license renewal, each licensed dispensing optician must submit a certificate or certificates of attendance for course hours completed as proof that his/her education requirements have been satisfied."

# **Opticianry at DeKalb Technical College**

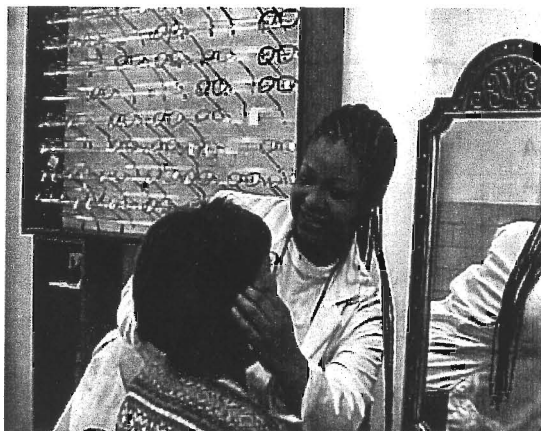
## **Associate of Applied Science Degree Program**

### **Overview**

Opticianry is about helping people - helping them obtain eye glasses or contact lenses that can be worn comfortably and satisfy their visual, fashion, and lifestyle needs. The optician is a professional vision care technologist who provides vision care correction to the patient. The optician analyzes and interprets the doctor's written eye correction prescription and then measures, adapts, selects and fits eyeglasses or contact lenses for the correction of visual and ocular anomalies.

Opticianry is an allied health program that provides the student with the special knowledge and skills necessary to practice as an optician. The student will learn to produce eyewear from basic laboratory components. Instruction is provided in the techniques of fitting, selecting, and adapting eyewear to patients. The student will also learn the instruments and basic techniques used to fit, select, and evaluate contact lenses. Introductory courses cover basic optics and ocular science including anatomy, optics, and eyewear fabrication. Advanced courses allow the student to gain specific skills in eyewear dispensing, contact lenses, and professional management. This is accomplished by a combination of on-campus clinics and community-based externships.



### **Availability**

The entire opticianry program is available on campus or online using the internet. Many of the online courses do require laboratory or clinical instruction which may either be obtained on-campus or at an on-the-job site using a preceptor to monitor student progress.

Upon successful completion of the program, the student is eligible to apply for national certification (ABOC, NCLC) and the state licensure examination to become a Licensed Dispensing Optician (LDO).

## Employment Outlook

A graduate of the program may become an employee, manager, or proprietor of an optical firm. Graduates may also secure a position as an optician, contact lens fitter, technician, or assistant in a professional office of ophthalmology, optometry, corporate eyewear retailer, hospital, or clinic. Some graduates pursue additional degrees in general science, health science, economics, business or education.

Employment in this occupation is expected to increase as demand grows for corrective lenses. The number of middle-aged and elderly persons is projected to increase rapidly. Middle age is a time when many individuals use corrective lenses for the first time, and elderly persons require more vision care, on the whole, than others. Fashion, too, influences demand. Frames come in a growing variety of styles and colors—encouraging people to buy more than one pair.

Demand is also expected to grow in response to the availability of new technologies that improve the quality and look of corrective lenses, such as anti-reflective coatings and bifocal lenses without the line visible in old-style bifocals. Improvements in bifocal, extended wear, and disposable contact lenses will also spur demand. The need to replace those who leave the occupation will result in job openings.

**Joint Statement**

**TO: All Georgia Optometrists Licensed Dispensing Opticians, Unlicensed Owners  
and Operators of Optical Businesses**

It has come to the attention of the Georgia Board of Optometry and the Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians that clarification is needed in regards to the employment of unlicensed optical workers and their dispensing status. This clarification is related to unlicensed optical workers who are not directly employed by the on-site optometrist.

**Optician's Rule 420-4-.01, All Work Under Supervision of Licensed Dispensing Optician specially states:**

Any trainee, apprentice, unlicensed optician, or any other person working for and under a licensed dispensing optician, optometrist, or physician shall not do optical dispensing unless he/she is working exclusively for and under the direct supervision of a licensed dispensing optician, optometrist, or physician and does not hold himself/herself out to the public generally as a dispensing optician. Direct supervision shall mean daily, onsite, close contact while optical dispensing is taking place within the retail establishment.

The Georgia Board of Optometry, the Georgia Board of Dispensing Opticians interpret this Rule to allow disciplinary action against any optometrist who performs duties or assists in unlicensed practice of opticianry under their licensure, unless the optical worker is an employee of the on-site optometrist. "Supervisory Contracts" do not supercede the laws and rules governing these practices. Georgia optometrists entering into these agreements place their license at risk for disciplinary action under the unprofessional conduct rule. Additionally, unlicensed optical workers may be subjected to civil penalties and felony criminal prosecution where provided by the law.

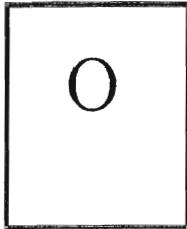
